**TEXT:**

Organized Crime, 10<sup>th</sup> edition, Howard Abadinsky, Wadsworth Publishing, Belmont, California, 2013. Required.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

1. Study the history and structure of organized crime in the U.S. and throughout the world.
2. Examine the various organized criminal enterprises in existence today.
3. Consider methods used by law enforcement to combat organized crime.

**COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

1. Attend class regularly.
2. Read assigned material and come to class prepared.
3. Participate in class discussions and activities.
4. Graded assignments:

**EXAMINATIONS:** 4 section exams consisting of multiple choice and essay questions. Students will be tested on material covered in class lectures and discussions, videos, handouts, and the textbook. Each section exam is worth 20% of the student's final grade. Tentative dates for exams are listed below.

**PROJECT:** Virtual OC. Each student will be assigned to a group. Each group will represent a virtual version of an actual American outlaw motorcycle gang, with a specific structure and function similar to what is known about the actual group. At the end of the semester, each group will make an in-class presentation about their respective outlaw motorcycle gang, including information about its history, structure, and activities. In addition, students will keep a personal weekly journal of virtual activities and observations about their role in the organized crime group to which they belong. The presentations and completed journals are due on the date listed in the course schedule.

The presentations and completed written assignments are due on the dates listed in the course schedule.

This project will be worth 20% of the student's final grade, with these points apportioned as follows:

Written report – 10 points

Presentation – 10 points

Attendance at group meetings – 6 additional points (2 points per meeting, up to a maximum of 3 meetings)

Additional information about this project will be provided in class.

Each task force group will be allotted some class time on a scheduled basis so that members may confer about the ongoing project. However, students should expect to do most of their work on this project outside of class.

**MAKEUP EXAMS:** Each student may make up ONE of the section exams. Make-ups will be given ONLY during the date and time listed in the Course Schedule. These exams will not be identical to the ones given during the semester, but will be in the same format and will cover the same material.

**LATE SUBMISSIONS:** All written assignments are due at the start of class on the date listed in the course schedule, and are considered late thereafter. Late submissions will be penalized 10 points per calendar day.

No “extra credit” assignments will be given. Any student requesting extra credit work will be “whacked”.

**GRADING:** The final grade will be assigned as a letter grade, based on the following scale:

A = 90 – 100 points

B = 80 – 89 points

C = 70 – 79 points

D = 60 – 69 points

F = 59 points and below

A grade of Incomplete will be given only in rare circumstances, for good cause shown, such as a serious illness that precludes completion of the course. An Incomplete will not be given solely for failure to complete assignments on time. The instructor and the department chair shall have sole discretion in granting an Incomplete grade.

Grades, announcements, and schedule changes will be posted on D2L. Students are urged to check their D2L site regularly.

**ATTENDANCE:** Regular class attendance is directly related to academic success. Therefore, attendance in class should be a priority, and a mandatory attendance policy will be enforced. Each student will be allowed a maximum of three absences during the semester. These are at the student's discretion – no doctor's notes or other documentation is required. However, upon the fourth and subsequent absence, one letter grade will be deducted from the student's final grade for each class missed.

Roll will be called at the start of each class. Students who arrive late are solely responsible for checking in with the instructor IMMEDIATELY AFTER CLASS. Two late arrivals are the equivalent of one absence.

The only exceptions to this policy are for documented mandatory military service or a court subpoena or summons.

Students are solely responsible for managing their enrollment status in a class; nonattendance does not constitute a withdrawal.

**ACADEMIC INTEGRITY:** Every KSU student is responsible for upholding the provisions of the Student Code of Conduct, as published in the Undergraduate and Graduate Catalogs. The instructor reserves the right at any time to observe the screen content of any device used during class. If content other than class notes or other relevant material is visible, the student will be required to shut off the device and will not be allowed to use it in class thereafter.
