Course Description

This course is a survey and overview of policing in the United States, including a description of the historical development of modern policing, the structure and organization of police agencies in the United States and as assessment and analysis of policing in America.

Course Objectives

1. Trace the evolution of policing in the United States.
2. Identify and discuss the types of law enforcement agencies in the United States.
3. Discuss issues related to the nature of police work.
4. Define law enforcement organization and composition.
5. Discuss the relationship between the police and the community.
6. Identify the functions of law enforcement agencies.
7. Contrast crime control, service and order.
8. Discuss police misconduct.
9. Discuss current trends and future possibilities in policing.

Course Requirements

- Mid-Term Exam: Includes Chapters 1-10 and lectures.
- Final Exam: Includes Chapters 11-17, lectures and student presentations.
- Local Law Enforcement Agency Review Assignment (handed out in class).
- Research Paper & Presentation: Each student will prepare a short research paper (subject matter assigned by instructor) consisting of a minimum of two type-written, double-spaced, 12-font pages, using either the APA or MLA writing style. Papers will have a minimum of two references. Your paper will be due on the day of your presentation. Late papers will have 10 points per calendar day subtracted from the overall score of the assignment. The subject matter of the paper will then be presented to the class using PowerPoint. Spelling and grammar will be graded on the paper and presentation. The paper and presentation will each be graded and will each carry 50% of the weight of the grade for this assignment. There will be exam questions related to the presentations, so pay attention to your classmates when they present.
- Course attendance is crucial to learning the subject matter of the course. You will earn four points of final exam extra credit for perfect attendance. **Those missing more than five class sessions will have ten points deducted from their overall final average grade.**
