SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course presents the fundamental principles of criminal investigation. Emphasis is placed on legal requirements stated in Georgia Criminal Law, definition of felony crimes stated in Georgia Code and fundamentals of: investigative procedures, crime scene searches, identification and collection of evidence, note-taking and report writing, surveillance, identification of witnesses and suspects, interviews and interrogation, and preparation and presentation of evidence in court. Topics include: Georgia Criminal Law, common investigative techniques, and procedures used for investigating various crimes.

COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

The student must be able to:

- demonstrate an understanding of basic investigative responsibilities.
- demonstrate an understanding of investigating crimes against property.
- demonstrate an understanding of challenges to the criminal investigator regarding computer crime, organized crime, hate crime, gang-related crime and terrorism.
- demonstrate a knowledge of Georgia Criminal Law, common investigative techniques, and procedures used for investigating various crimes.

A A grade of "A" will be awarded for work which far exceeds the minimum expectations for the assignment , not only by doing all that is asked, but by demonstrating superior skill, thoroughness, independence of thought, and creativity.

B Grades in the "B" range are very good grades. They indicate above average grasp and mastery of the subject matter, evidenced not only by meeting the basic objectives but also by showing some initiative in

pursuing lines of inquiry and some creativity in the use of new understandings.

C Grades in the “C” range indicate that the basic objectives of the course have been achieved, that the student has demonstrated satisfactory mastery of the course material. This grade indicates that the minimum expectations have been met.

D A “D” is assigned to work which is passing but below average competency for college students. A student receiving this grade has not exerted a level of effort or expertise which is expected of the average student.

F An “F” is assigned to work that does not meet the minimum expectations of the course, demonstrates an unjustifiable lack of command over the course material, a significant absence of effort on the part of the student.
